

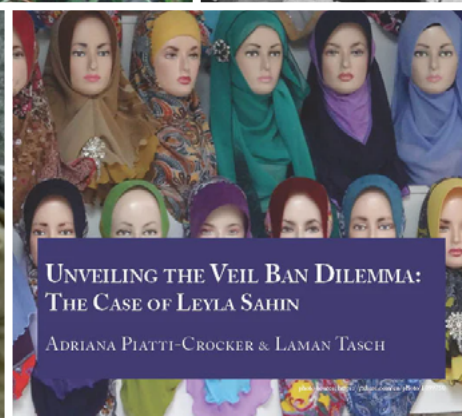
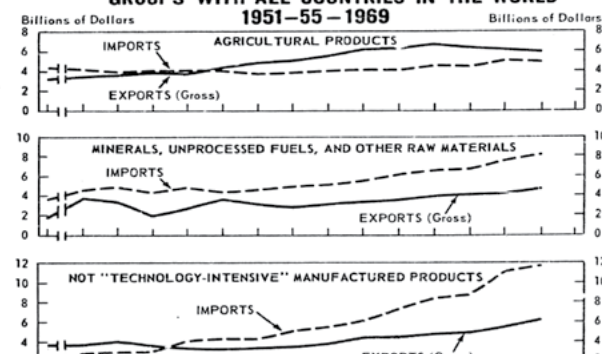


Fig. 1 TRENDS IN U.S. TRADE IN FOUR DEFINED COMMODITY GROUPS WITH ALL COUNTRIES IN THE WORLD 1951-55-1969

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THEMATIC COVERAGE

The **Global Issues Library** is continuously growing with new collections and content. There are currently over 300 issues, topics, and events, from the late 1780s to the present, critical to understanding global affairs today—including U.S./Mexico border issues, the Rwandan genocide, the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, the Cuban Revolution, climate migration in the Pacific, international nuclear disarmament, and the death penalty.

Curated by cross-disciplinary advisory boards of scholars from around the world, the complete Library incorporates:

- 620,000 pages and growing, including rare, previously unpublished archival material, government documents, oral histories, and personal narratives;
- 1000 hours of streaming documentaries, media footage, and other types of video;
- 250 case studies for the classroom;
- 3,000 photographs.

Issues and events are presented from multiple perspectives—personal, governmental, institutional, legal, contemporaneous, and retrospective—permitting the comparison of issues in a variety of contexts and in an interdisciplinary manner. For example, students and scholars can use the multimedia content to explore some of the following topics:

- How atrocities and war occur and their aftermath across borders;
- How climate change and security issues affect displacement;
- The global history of disaster planning and emergency management;
- The triggers of revolutions and what follows after regime changes;
- The global trends in mass incarceration and the prison infrastructure of specific countries.

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“I am passionate about the meaning of borders in our world, since being able to cross the iron curtain in 1987 and seeing the reality of a closed border from inside the closed country. This why I also wrote my M.A. thesis in 1996 on borders, prior to working with International Organization for Migration (IOM). And with the lock down of the COVID 19 pandemic, we see borders again playing a strong symbolic and practical role as I haven’t seen for years in Western Europe. The ‘Borders and Migration Collection at Alexander Street Press’ offers a unique approach to understanding migration and borders. It achieves something that is rare: to share data and knowledge while keeping a human approach, as migration is about people’s lives, destinies and hopes. of documents, students and scholars can gain a deeper understanding of global issues and their interconnectedness, approaching the subject matter from different perspectives.

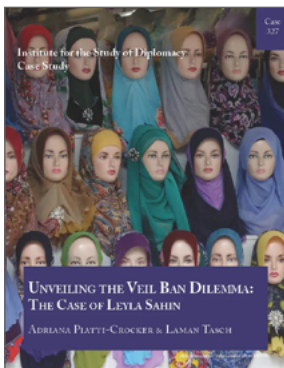

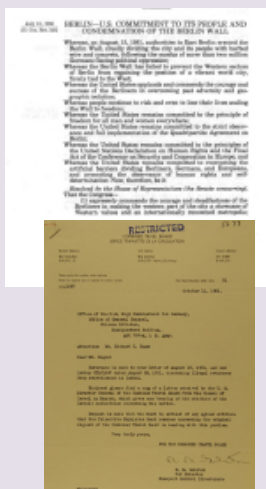

ENGINEERING CASE STUDIES ONLINE

Analysis of failures, from nuclear disasters to aviation accidents, is a critical part of the curriculum for engineering students and studies into the history of technology. Such a focus gives future engineers and interdisciplinary scholars insights into design flaws that resulted in devastation to human lives and environmental damage.

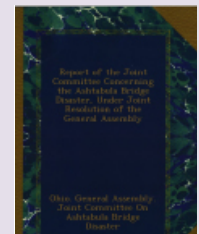

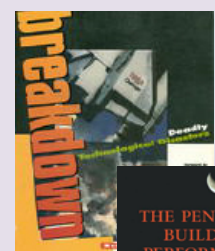

In order to understand the ongoing impact of past crimes against humanity—and to work toward the prevention of future crimes—research and learning on human rights issues is an increasingly popular area of study. Yet, it can be difficult for students

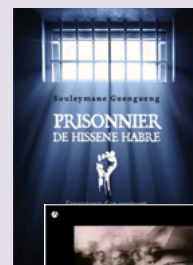

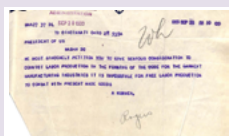

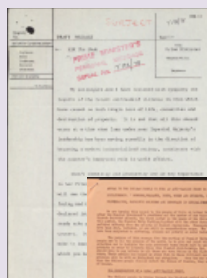

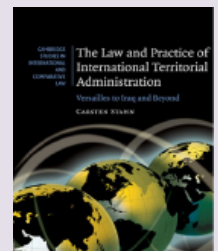

While many believe that the open borders help the EU thrive economically and foster peace between European nations, there are critics who state that free movement of citizens around the EU could hinder its ability to protect security and keep out illegal migrants. Playlist: Borders: A Multiregional History by David Spreen

This is the beginning of a playlist focusing on the fluidity of 20th century borders drawing on the post-WWII reorganization of Eastern Europe, the often arbitrary politics of decolonization in Africa under European colonization, and the politics of naming. Before non-racialist allegiances there are often untranslatable and multiple positions: after WWII, it was a real possibility that Albania would form a Yugoslav Republic. Only as Eliezer Neftali has shown - after Stalin's first out with Tito and Albania seized the opportunity to make independence from Yugoslavia "impossible" a corner stone of its politics. The genocide in Rwanda is perhaps the most infamous case of consequences of European colonial "hunting," but it's by no means the only case. Finally, the case of the Soviet Empire, that created nations out of often entirely arbitrary cultural traits under the consultation of "Turkic" ethnographers is perhaps the most well-documented case of nation making by an empire that backfired as early as the 1920s.

The primary sources in this playlist are selected to emphasize the uncertainty of border-making, but this needs to be expanded to have a closer look at the consequences in the different cases. Sorry, due to rights restrictions, some of the items in this playlist are unavailable to you.
